According to the Paideia Principles, "all children can learn," and the "primary cause of learning is the activity of the learner's own mind"

The Augsburg Paideia Institute

offers educators hands-on experience with three types of teaching: didactic, coaching, and socratic seminars. Sessions are designed for participants to feel the excitement of learning through discussion and to gain know-how and ideas for implementing Paideia in their classroom.

In Paideia seminars, the new roles taken on by students and teachers promote learning through deepened insights and enlarged understanding of ideas. Students enjoy acquiring skills for discussion, agreement, and disagreement that carry over to other aspects of their lives.

In this institute, we emphasize primary sources that help us to think critically, understand timeless ideas, listen carefully, question thoughtfully, and make education work.

What are the Key Elements in the Training?

The Institute focuses on the big picture of teaching and learning:

- Didactic teaching for the retention of facts and information.
- Coaching for skill development.
- Socratic seminars for enhancement and understanding of ideas.

In a four-day, concentrated schedule, the institute offers experience and practice for new and veteran Paideia teachers at all levels of schooling. The schedule includes seminars, debriefings, small-group sessions, selecting materials, coaching for specific skills, curriculum development, and writing.

What are the Results?

Teachers give Paideia top grades for:

- Increasing critical thinking skills and reading comprehension.
- Improving communication skills, oral and written.
- Focusing more time on integrated curriculum.
- Improving participation of students across different levels of performance and cultural backgrounds.
- Changing the dynamics between teacher and learner.
- Contributing to better attendance.
