The Process of Developing An Effective Thesis – An Interactive Worksheet

Concept:

Steps taken in developing a thesis for a paper:

Step 1: Explore your own knowledge about the subject and make generalizations based on your experiences.

Step 2: Explore the assignment and develop an argument or opinion that responds to the question that is tasked.

Step 3: Take a stand on the subject and create a working thesis.

Step 4: Find evidence to support your own working thesis.

Step 5: As you write, continue to change and update your working thesis until it fits your purpose and your evidence.

Reflect: After reading your thesis statement, the reader should think, "This essay is going to convince me of something. I'm not convinced yet, but I'm interested to see how I might be."
