- apply kinesthetic work to the rehearsal of selected excerpts


This clinic is open to school, church, and municipal choral directors as well as university students studying conducting.

About the Conductor

Richard Bjella is a distinguished conductor, clinician, and choral teacher and arranger who has served as artistic director of the San Antonio Chamber Choir. He recently retired from Texas Tech University, where he was director of choral studies and received a Professing Excellence Award, which acknowledges outstanding faculty who go above and beyond, both inside and outside the classroom, to impact students' learning and academic success.

Bjella previously served as director of choral studies at the Lawrence Conservatory of Music, leading the concert choir in an acclaimed performance at the 2009 American Choral Directors Association National Convention. He has presented workshops at ACDA national and regional conventions and has been a headliner for teacher and student events around the United States. Bjella presented masterclasses around the world and at over 400 festivals and workshops in 32 states, including several appearances at Lincoln Center, Orchestra Hall, and Carnegie Hall. He is a contributing writer for "The Oxford Handbook of Choral Pedagogy" with his chapter, "The Art of Successful Programming: Study, Selection, and Synthesis," and he continues to promote creative choral programming.
