Ain Dah Yung (Our Home) Center (ADY) provides American Indian culturally relevant Emergency Shelter for children and youth, Transitional Housing Lodge for homeless youth and young adults, and therapeutic prevention, intervention, and aftercare services to those in the Shelter and Lodge, and area American Indian children, youth, and families. The majority of the children served are from very low or no income families living in poverty within the Twin City area or are referred from the County, local social service agencies, schools, or the Ain Dah Yung Street Outreach Program. Ain Dah Yung provides a safe, loving, and supportive environment for American Indian children and youth where they are able to attach to new positive role models, learn more effective ways of relating in their family and community, and further develop a positive sense of their self. Ain Dah Yung Shelter does serve a diverse population of youth, but focuses on serving on the American Indian Community. Ain Dah Yung serves youth between the ages of 5-17 years in our Emergency Shelter setting.

Internship Opportunities:

1. Provide direct care, behavior management, supervision to shelter residents. This includes: monitoring personal hygiene, health, medication administration, behavioral/emotional status, conflict resolution/counseling between residents if needed and may include: maintaining a sanitary environment by performing light maintenance duties and delegating such duties/chores to residents and other staff.
2. Prepare and order nutritious snacks and meals for shelter residents.
3. Plan and facilitate daily engaging, interactive activities and groups of a recreational, cultural or educational nature, by in providing these groups in accordance with weekly schedule.
4. Coordinate client appointments of a recreational, cultural or educational nature, in accordance with daily schedule. (Including house meetings, support groups).
5. Provide Case Management Support by: Supervise parental visits, Document in appropriate logs and files, Complete client Intakes and Discharges. This includes: cleaning resident's room, obtaining resident's evaluation, labeling and storing belongings
6. Must work in conjunction with other Youth Care Workers by enforcing program policies and procedures, provide emotional support to shelter residents and their families and Screen Crisis referrals.

AMRTC is an inpatient psychiatric treatment facility within State Operational Services/Adult Mental Health (SOS) that is designed to provide assessment, stabilization, and discharge planning services for individuals needing hospital-level psychiatric care that cannot be provided within the community based or SOS system of care due to individual risk factors & clinical complexity. As members of interdisciplinary teams, social workers contribute to program development, treatment planning for all patients and collaborate in the development and maintenance of the therapeutic milieu. Social Work services are provided to all patients ages 18 and older (and involved family or support systems) with all major psychiatric disorders, including schizophrenia, affective disorders, neuropsychiatric disorders, eating disorders, personality disorders, substance abuse, and organic psychoses. Social work services are provided in collaboration with our partners in State Operational Services, community-based mental health and human service systems, and are provided in a manner that meets both internal and external regulatory standards, consistent with best practices. Major functions and services provided incorporate generalist and clinical scope of practice as authorized through individual licensure level by the MN Board of Social Work, including: early identification of patient-specific, service planning/community resource and systemic barriers to optimal discharge coordination for people with serious and persistent mental illness and co-occurring medical or substance abuse conditions; early problem/need identification, active treatment planning and care management strategies to address high-risk or challenging problems to support the best outcomes and solutions for patients in the community-based continuum of care; advocacy; individual, family or group modalities; information and referral; crisis intervention; consultation, liaison, and interdisciplinary collaboration; mandated reporting of neglect and abuse; discharge, transition, and aftercare planning; post discharge follow-up; care management; development, maintenance, and ongoing evaluation of community referral resources. Major categories of problems and psychosocial factors addressed by social workers as they impinge individual needs related to the understanding, treatment, and relapse prevention and aftercare needs of the psychiatric disorder, include; housing and living arrangements; financial, health insurance and basic needs; problems related to substance abuse or other psychiatric or medical illness; legal issues; family relationships and caregiving problems; patient and family reactions and adjustments to illness and hospitalization; patient's developmental history; vocational and educational background; relationship problems; problems related to physical, sexual and emotional abuse; cultural, spiritual or religious background, past treatment history and adherence; and assessment of the formal/informal support system. The Social Services Department utilizes multiple discharge and service planning processes to optimize the impact of services provided to improve coordination of care between inpatient and community partners, prevent delays in care and treatment, identify service gaps and improve outcomes for

We are a community medical clinic providing services to anyone, but especially individuals on public assistance, MA or GA. About 60% of our patients are African refugees in need of social services and resources. About 40% of our patients are elderly. The Center provides multidisciplinary rehabilitative treatment, including social services, for survivors of foreign political torture. The chief methodology in direct social services is casework, but also may include program planning, group work, community organization, education and training.

Learning Opportunities:

Working on a multidisciplinary team and adapting social work skills to a non-social service agency setting. Working cross-culturally with clients from a variety of cultures/countries. Working with interpreters, exposure to refugee, political asylum/immigration, and human rights issues; exploring how to incorporate these concerns into social work practice. Education about trauma sequelae and treatment; experience adapting social work skills to working with trauma survivors. Seeking and using community resources for clients from other cultures. Specific activities will include initial social work assessments of new clients and planning and implementing social interventions to meet identified needs. Interventions may include: information and referral; cultural orientation and education; resource investigation and development; problem-solving skills, task-oriented and supportive counseling; advocacy; crisis intervention; psycho-educational groups; and working with volunteers. Students will also participate in the Information and Referral Service which provides information and resources to community professionals as well as screens potential clients for CVT services. Students will provide social work services to individual clients, as well as clients receiving services through our group treatment approach.

Our program is the community based component of the child and adolescent state hospitals at Willmar and Brainerd. We provide intensive treatment services and run the Minnesota Intensive Therapeutic Home program serving children and adolescents with severe emotional disturbance and acting out behaviors. We have foster homes in the metro area and outstate. We provide individual and family therapy, skills work, crisis intervention, diagnostic assessments and coordination of services.

We also are a new program at the state and are working extensively with community partners to create programs that meet the needs of our most challenging children.

Clinical

Clinical internships are available in which the intern gains experience in individual therapy, family therapy, crisis intervention, diagnostic assessment, and DBT skills. Most of our clinical work occurs in the foster homes or in the homes of families we work with. Interns also interact with the hospital staff and have a chance to learn about the treatment that is provided there. Our treatment approach is highly individualized and strengths-based. All the children and youth in our program have teams made up of professionals and family members.

We provide services in child care; child abuse prevention; domestic and international adoption (including pregnancy counseling and post adoption services); international humanitarian aid; mental health counseling; financial counseling; education and support groups; domestic abuse prevention.

Internship Opportunities:

1. MSW Adoption Intern (MSW 1st year, non-clinical): The MSW Adoption Intern will work with the International Adoption Department, participating in all available activities related to adoption. The intern will gain knowledge of the Adoption processes and Minnesota adoption laws; observe group and individual assessment sessions and learn to facilitate both; learn counseling techniques, evaluation skills and ethics regarding social work assessment and assist in upkeep of client files. Prefer Tuesdays availability. Flexibility to attend periodic trainings on Thursday evenings and Friday afternoons.
2. Adoption Education & Support Intern (MSW 1st year, non-clinical): The Adoption Education & Support Intern will have some client contact through various groups and search work; responsibilities will be increased depending on the performance and willingness of the intern. The intern will become proficient and knowledgeable about the adoption process and post adoption services and will – with staff assistance, help facilitate educational offerings, including activities for adopted persons.
3. Domestic Search and Intermediary Service Intern (MSW 1st year, non-clinical): The Domestic Search and Intermediary Service Intern will work with an experienced team of social workers to provide search and intermediary services for adopted persons and birthparents who were adopted or gave birth in Minnesota. An intern will learn how to prepare and discuss a genetic background history with members of the adoption family. They will also learn how to provide search and intermediary services as mandated by Minnesota law. Services will include client consultation on preparing for the outreach and completing a search. Interns will also work to support the communication exchange, help members of the adoption circle to be sensitive to the experiences of the other parties and share how adoption practice has changed since their adoption. Client contact will be primarily by phone.
4. M & M Program Intern (BSW Senior): The M & M (Mentor & Mentee) program is a mentorship program for adopted adults (mentors) and youth (mentees), with the hopes of offering support to mentees as they learn more about themselves and their identity as an adopted person. The intern is responsible for ongoing program management, maintaining communication between volunteers, parents, and agency staff; and assisting with outreach efforts for both youth and adults.
5. Adoption Education & Support Intern (BSW Senior): The Adoption Education & Support Intern will – with staff assistance – partner with adoptive

CLUES is a leading provider of social services for the Latino Community in Minnesota through its five core service areas of Mental Health, Chemical Health, Employment, Education, and Elder Wellness. CLUES' mental health services are designed to serve the Latino Community in a bilingual and bicultural manner. Mental health clients receive the utmost respect and understanding when receiving comprehensive evaluations and treatments within our Rule 29 clinic licensed by the Department of human Services. Case managers also see clients off site at other locations including schools, homes, and community centers. Throughout the years, CLUES mental health services developed and grew with a continued focus on providing more efficient and effective services to clients through best practices. In 2007 mental health and chemical health joined forces to create the combined mental illness chemical dependency (MICD) treatment program, the first of its kind that is bilingual and bicultural in the state, to effectively treat co-occurring disorders.

Students would have the opportunity to work in mental health, family services, and aging well departments. Educational level (bachelor's or master's) and internship requirements will determine the appropriateness of the intern's activities. Types of activities available may include: therapy (individual, family, couple, group), victim advocacy for victims of sexual assault, case management, parenting education, coordinating therapeutic activities in the adult day center. .

Interns will learn valuable client charting skills through peer chart reviews and clinical consultation. Interns will learn how different programs within an agency can work together holistically. The intern will also gain an understanding of how different systems (government) can influence programming and funding streams. Students should have some training in boundaries, and an open mind to learning and cultural competency.

Students exploring clinical placement would be exposed to different styles of therapy such as narrative, cognitive-behavioral, psycho-dynamic, etc. Students will learn how to perform diagnostic assessment, create and implement treatment/case plans. Students may learn how to use basic assessment tools (CASII, SDQ, PHQ-9). Students will learn practical and clinical skills as well as how funding influences agency programming.

Hennepin County Medical Center is a Level 1 Trauma Center located in downtown Minneapolis. The social services department has approximately 25 members. The mission of Jewish Family Service of St. Paul is to help individuals and families create the lives they want. The agency provides service to members of the St. Paul community (Ramsey, Dakota, and Washington counties) in these major areas: senior services, counseling and early intervention, vocational improvement, refugee resettlement, services to original Russian speakers, community Information and Referral, and emergency assistance to people facing financial crisis. Services are non denominational. Populations at risk served by the agency include many members of our community who face discrimination or other barriers; these include low-income individuals, people of color, persons with mental health and other disabilities, those with limited English, and other refugees and immigrants.

We have field internships available in two of our programs: Senior Services (MSW) and Community Resources/Employment Services (BSW & MSW). The primary methodologies for both placements will include intake, assessment, case management, and information and referral. These placements will be an opportunity to develop these skills with a variety of populations, including people of color, low-income individuals, immigrants, and persons with disabilities. In addition to direct individual service with clients, students may have the opportunity to develop and implement group services, as well as community presentations. We also provide cross-disciplinary opportunities to consult with other agency staff, including social workers, refugee specialists, nurses, a clinical social worker, and a psychologist.

Senior Services (BSW or MSW): The Senior Service department provides case management for frail seniors living in the community. Case managers complete in-home assessments, make referrals for services {meals-on-wheels, housekeeping, transportation, etc.}, monitor clients, act as a liaison with other involved agencies, provide information on various resources, and counsel seniors and their families around aging issues. The goal is to keep seniors living in the community and prevent premature institutionalization. Students will learn about issues impacting seniors including physical health, mental health, environmental and social supports. They will also gain knowledge about the various financial and service delivery systems in place to support seniors and their families and learn how to effectively access those systems. Other areas in which students will gain skills include assessing cognitive impairment in older adults, team building, case management, and caregiver coaching and education.

Community Resources/Employment Services (BSW or MSW): This program helps individuals secure and maintain employment by identifying interests, providing job seeking and retention skills, and providing follow-up support after job placement. The internship also includes case management to address barriers to employment and other goals for individuals and their families; including identification of barriers, development of a plan to meet needs, and

Boys are referred by probation officers and social workers from across Minnesota. The guys participate in treatment, continue their education, maintain employment, and build independent living skills. Placements through MHR typically occur during regular business hours. Since a majority of services are delivered in the field, a valid driver's license and car are required.

MHR's mission is to foster hope and recovery for those affected by mental illness. It is a progressive agency that provides community-based mental health services to adults recovering from mental illness. MHR operates 16 programs and provides services in Ramsey, Dakota, and Hennepin counties. The focus of programming is on increasing the self-reliance of clients, reducing dependence on hospitals and other forms of institutional treatment, and on enhancing clients' abilities to live full lives in the community. MHR provides a variety of services including case management, counseling, medication education and monitoring, living skills education, supportive housing, social network development, and family psycho-education. Primary methodologies used are individual casework and interdisciplinary team-work. The agency utilizes several evidence-based practices, including the operation of three Assertive Community Treatment Teams (ACT), and the incorporation of Integrated Dual Disorders Treatment (IDDT) and Illness Management and Recovery (IMR).

The intern will work as a member of one of three treatment teams, assisting clients who confront issues associated with mental illness, chemical dependency, poverty and/or homelessness.

- Students working on ACT teams will see clients of other team members, as well as serving as a primary case manager for a partial caseload. In addition, these students will work closely with the teams' psychiatrists, psychiatric nurses, vocational specialists, and chemical dependency specialists.
- Students working on the Targeted Case Management teams will assess clients' strengths and the functional impact of mental illness, connect clients with needed mental health services, and monitor and evaluate the delivery of services.
- While services throughout the agency are typically delivered in clients' homes or other community settings, students placed at the Seward CSP will be based primarily on-site, and will have the opportunity to do group work, individual skill-building, and community building activities. Task centered therapy, cognitive-behavioral interventions, motivational interviewing, and problem solving strategies are employed throughout the agency, as well as a harm-reduction approach to chemical dependency. Students will learn how to conduct functional and psychosocial assessments, develop individual treatment plans, coordinate with other resources and professionals, and complete progress reports. MHR's programs offer students weekday hours and scheduling can be negotiated with the student. Supervision may come in the form of task (on-site) and clinical (off-site) supervision.

Agency Description:

Robbinsdale is a public school system serving the communities of Robbinsdale, Crystal, Plymouth, New Hope, Golden Valley, Brooklyn Center and Brooklyn Park. We provide education services for children from early childhood through high school. Our student body is diverse, both socio-economically and culturally.

Learning Opportunities:

As a social worker in the Robbinsdale district, we provide liaison services between the school and the family as well as the school and community resources. Each building offers it own unique challenges which can be addressed through group work, individual work, family support, etc. All social workers deal with truancy and educational neglect from early intervention services through court referral. We are part of the special education team and work closely with special education teachers, psychologists, chemical health personnel, guidance counselors, administration, etc.

The Phillips Neighborhood is a culturally diverse, low income area with much street activity. Southside is a center for families who are at risk for abuse/neglect. Therapeutic Services Agency has been providing services since 1978 providing meaningful effective services to children, youth and their families utilizing 3 primary models of service delivery: In-Home Family Based Services, Foster Care Based Comprehensive Treatment Program that is site based in Pine City, and outpatient mental health services in Pine City, St. Paul and Anoka offices.

Transitional Housing Programs:

In-Residence: This program offers advocacy/support/case management to women/families living in our Transitional Housing Program (Mpls). The University of Minnesota Medical Center and the University of Minnesota Children's Hospital are part of the Fairview Health Services system. Fairview's mission is to improve the health of the communities it serves. It commits its skills and resources to provide the finest in health care while addressing the physical, emotional and spiritual needs of individual and their families. This medical center is a tertiary care center and serves patients who come primarily for specialized health and mental health care. Specialized health care services include solid organ transplant, blood and marrow transplant, and specialties in oncology, pediatrics and intensive care. Social workers in this setting work on the various medical services to meet the psychosocial needs of patients and families in their assigned clinical areas.

The University of Minnesota Medical Center engages in education and research, providing a stimulating learning environment for students of various disciplines. Social work is an integral part of the health care team and students have many opportunities to work as part of an interdisciplinary team. Psychosocial assessments, crisis intervention, resource finding and referral, advocacy, supportive counseling and group work are among the intervention modalities used in this setting. In a first year placement students are able to build basic social work skills while working with individuals and families. Students are given structure and support as they begin to build a social work identity. In second year placements students can develop and refine social work skills while working more in depth with clients, both patients and their support systems. Each student works with a primary field instructor practicing clinical social work in a specialized medical area. Learning is enriched by observations with other staff social workers. A bi-weekly student group provides opportunities for learning, support, consultation and processing of the internship.

Volunteers of America is a large non-profit faith based social service organization having a 113-year history of serving people in need, nationally and in Minnesota. We are an independent, non-profit organization incorporated in Minnesota and chartered by the National Volunteers of America, Inc. We provide a wide variety of services to children and their families, school students, senior citizens, homeless women and their children, adults with special needs and youth and adult ex-offenders. The Volunteers of America Minnesota Family Treatment Program, uses an innovative team approach to develop, implement, and monitor a plan that services the unique needs of emotionally or behaviorally disturbed youth and their families. The Family Treatment Program includes Foster Care, Children's Mental Health Case Management, Children's Therapeutic Services and Supports, Family Visitation and Transportation Program and In-Home Relief Services. Referrals to the program are primarily from various counties. Funding for the Family Treatment Program is provided through county and state resources. The majority (approximately 90%) of the youth placed in our foster homes are Title IV-E eligible. The Foster Care Program is responsible for licensing and training foster parents and providing supervision of the foster home. The foster care social worker arranges for youth to be placed in our licensed foster homes. The program serves youth with the need for out of home placement from the ages of birth to legal emancipation, however a large majority of youth in the program are over the age of 12. The youth may have emotional or behavioral disabilities that require individualized treatment approaches. The program goal is to provide a safe, stable, therapeutic living environments for youth, while assisting in the development and implementation of a permanent plan. Treatment plans are completed and goals are regularly reviewed with the child's team. Services are generally provided in the foster home, community or school.

The Children's Mental Health Case Management program serves youth under the age of 18 who have mental health needs. Case Management services are designed to enable a child to improve or maintain emotional or behavioral functioning in order to remain with the child's family in the community. Each youth is assigned a Mental Health Case Manager to work with the youth and youth's parent or guardian to provide and coordinate services. The case manager is part of the youth's team consisting of parents, therapists, psychiatrists, school staff, and other service providers making sure the collaborative individual and family treatment plan is carried out. Services are primarily provided in the home or community.

The Children's Therapeutic Services and Supports is a structured program of intensive in-home mental health services including individual or family psychotherapy and individual or family skills training and development. Services are provided in the home, community or school. The purpose of the service is to assist youth who have mental health concerns which limit the child's ability to function in primary aspects of daily living. The service is

Woodson Institute for Student Excellence (WISE) is a k-8 public charter school located in North Minneapolis. WISE exists to ensure the academic and social development of students; while restoring the essence of family and community, with an emphasis on academic excellence, cultural awareness and responsible citizenship. 99% of students attending WISE are African Americans. Families choose WISE for a variety of reasons. Some are: High behavioral and academic expectations, afro-centric programming, student enrichment activities before and after school and an engaging family involvement model. WISE students are well familiar with the Nguzo Saba or the 7 principals of Kwanzaa as they are infused into all programming and student expectations. Students are taught to embrace and be proud of who they are as cultural people. WISE uses the Boys Town communication strategies as a way of teaching social skills and managing discipline at school. Students primarily live in North Minneapolis and surrounding suburbs. More than 90% of WISE families live at or below the level of poverty.

Interns will work as part of a social work team of at least 2 MSW level social workers. This internship position would likely be a shared responsibility between an elementary Special Education Setting 3 classroom and a more mainstream school-wide setting either in the same building or in a nearby middle school.

The Setting 3 classroom is a restrictive setting and mostly self-contained. The program serves students grades K-5 under various Special Education categories, primarily Emotional Behavioral Disability (EBD) and Autism Spectrum Disorder (ASD).
