**Music Notes:** Chicago native Betty Jackson King (1928-1994) spent her career as an educator and her compositional output was relatively small. She wrote primarily for voice, chorus, and piano and published only one work for organ, titled Nuptial Suite and published in 1969. The prelude is the middle movement from that suite.

Robert Nathaniel Dett (1982-1943) was born in Canada and educated primarily in the United States; he was the first African American to graduate from Oberlin College, and he later studied at Harvard and the prestigious Eastman School of Music in Rochester, New York. He was a prolific composer for choir, voice, orchestra, and chamber ensemble, and some of his most enduring works are written for solo piano. His delightful Juba Dance is based on a popular 19th-century African American dance that entailed stomping on the ground followed by two fast handclaps.
