- Softball—New head coach Tim Gormley, only the third coach in Augsburg's softball history, is doing a fine job building his team this year in its spring competitions.
- Baseball—Auggie baseball games are played at Parade Stadium in Minneapolis, under head coach Keith Bateman. This season the team is contending for a spot in the conference playoffs.
- Track and field—Head coach Dennis Barker's young team showed strong performances
 at the conference indoor championships in March and are now competing at outdoor
 events.
- Golf—The women's team is showing continued improvement with head coach Laura Patrick. The men's team has a shot at qualifying for national competition in one of the most difficult regions. They are co-coached by alums Ted Vickerman '02 and Jim Rustad '95.

He will spend 10 weeks this summer in Washington, D.C., in an intensive German language program and then travel to Germany for space physics research at the Technical University of Braunschweig. What an honor for Augsburg!

Congratulations also to junior Brian Krohn, a chemistry and biology major, who has received a Goldwater Scholarship for 2007-08, totaling \$7,500. It is given to students in

Two physics students, Reid Larson and Kent Bodurtha, received Goldwater Honorable Mention, which places them in the top tiers. Congratulations to them, also! These are Augsburg's first Goldwater honors in four years, and we are proud of all three students.

Kudos to four Augsburg psychology majors who recently presented at professional conferences. Alyssa Kane and Shannon Ryan presented their research results in Memphis at the annual conference of the Society for Personality and Social Psychology. Their research adviser, Dave Matz, also presented.

Amanda Brey and Robert Tix traveled to New York City, along with adviser Nancy Steblay, to present their laboratory studies at "Off the Witness Stand," a conference at John Jay College of Criminal Justice. All four students are supported by URGO.

And a special congratulations to academic vice president and dean of the College, Barbara Edwards Farley, who recently was named as a participant in the 2007 Harvard Institute for Educational Management (IEM). This highly competitive institute brings together senior leaders in higher education for an intensive experience at Harvard aimed at helping to develop leadership capacity. I was pleased to nominate Dean Farley for this prestigious honor and I know she will represent Augsburg exceedingly well among this group of national leaders.
