Good morning! This past weekend, the Board of Regents met for its annual off-campus retreat. The agenda for the meeting—which also was attended by representatives of the faculty, staff, and student senates, and the parent/family council—included a wide range of topics: (1) Update on the One College mission conversations; (2) Discussion of the College's endowment; (3) Presentation on enrollment, tuition pricing, and financial aid; (4) Update and discussion of the Science@Augsburg project; and (5) An open conversation on ways we are translating the College's mission, vision, and strategy into plans for our future. It was a good and spirited meeting, full of helpful conversation and opportunities to learn more about the College. I am pleased to report to you that the Board of Regents is a dedicated and generous group of men and women who truly care about Augsburg College. We are indeed fortunate to benefit from their leadership.

Now that the regents have received a report on the One College project, I am pleased to announce that the departmental statements about how their work advances the mission of Augsburg will be available later this week on the website (www.augsburg.edu/president) under Advancing the Mission. The men's team, compiling an overall record of 13-3-3, achieved their first double-digit winning season since 1980 and their best season in more than 30 years.

Many thanks to Augsburg students, faculty, staff, alumni, and visitors who contributed a total of \$5,537 in donations to the Abundance Lunches to benefit the food shelf at the Brian Coyle Community Center. In addition, food donations were also collected.
