This week brings most faculty and staff back to work after time off during the Christmas break, as the campus prepares to welcome students for classes next week. Orientation will take place tomorrow for new students in the weekend and graduate programs, and new and transfer day students will attend "Transfermation" on Friday.

He will also be at a luncheon and meet with two classes on campus that day.

It's a great opportunity for alumni who live in these areas to stay connected with the College, and for our 50 student musicians to share their music. Tomorrow's concert is at 4 p.m. in Times Square, Ft. Myers Beach, and on Thursday in Naples at 7 p.m. at Shepherd of the Glades Lutheran Church.

She has decided to return back to Augsburg for spring semester because the university has not yet made a decision about whether the program will continue when spring semester begins at the end of January. There is also question about whether she'd be able to carry out her internship at a large medical center as planned.

CAMPUS PROJECTS AND INITIATIVES

"Navigating College"

Augsburg College is one of seven institutions in the state participating in Navigating College, an initiative of Minnesota Campus Compact that aims to improve access to higher education and retention of students from underserved populations such as first-generation, low income and students of color. This initiative was launched last summer with a conference on the impact of mentoring and coaching on student success.



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Augsburg's project is to develop a process for reaching out to each of our enrolled students and to document those contacts. Student service staff will connect with students at least once each term to identify their challenges and to provide additional support as needed. The project will also include enhancements to the student information system so that results can be tracked.

ACTC Student Affairs workshop

On Thursday, Augsburg will host the 2008 ACTC Student Affairs professional development workshop, which has been a collaboration of the five ACTC colleges for more than 20 years. This year's topic, "Critical Thinking: How We Are Role Models for Students," will be presented by Stephen Brookfield. This event bring together 150 student affairs professionals from the ACTC colleges and other area colleges and universities.

Congratulations and kudos to **Dave Conrad**, assistant director of the MBA program in Rochester, for a successful launch last Thursday of a series of innovative learning events in Rochester, "Connecting with the Community."
