Good morning. Already in this new semester, I am grateful for the important discussions engaging us around issues critical in our lives and those of our neighbors. Last Monday we were privileged to hear Professor Michael Thelwell speak about his experiences working with Martin Luther King Jr. in the Civil Rights movement, advocating for racial and social justice. This morning we continue these conversations in the first of three "Trumpet Talks," based on King's book, *The Trumpet of Conscience.* We'll meet at 11:30 in the Minneapolis Room, discussing the Vietnam War, led by Mary Laurel True, with guests from Vets for Peace. The other two meetings are on February 4 and 11, same place and time.

On Thursday this week, we join with fellows citizens across the nation as we focus our attention on the issue of global warming. Along with more than 1,000 other schools, places of worship, and organizations, Augsburg joins with Focus the Nation in a day-long, national teach-in. Augsburg faculty from a number of disciplines, staff, and students will present perspectives on solutions for global warming; the schedule parallels our class schedule so that faculty can take their classes to listen. Wednesday evening, events kick off with a movie webcast of "The 2% Solution."

In addition to the classes on Thursday I encourage you also to hear University of St. Thomas professor and U.S. Senate candidate Jack Nelson-Pallmeyer speak at chapel at 11:20 a.m., and to attend the Action Forum at 5 p.m. with Secretary of State Mark Ritchie, Council member Cam Gordon, and environmental advocates. It will be a full and enriching day—please plan to join us!
