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Good morning. It's amazing how things on our campus can change in 24 hours! In the time between midday Saturday and midday Sunday, Augsburg readied itself for the visit and campaign rally for Senator Hillary Clinton on her path to the Super Tuesday primaries. It was a most remarkable opportunity for the Augsburg community to become part of the national appearances by the candidates in the hours before the Super Tuesday primaries and caucuses, and to participate in the important work of civic engagement. Many, many thanks to Jodi Collen and the Events Services crew, David Warch and Marketing and Communication, John Pack and the Department of Public Safety, Athletic Facilities staff, Custodial staff, the music from Gospel Praise instrumentalists, senior Beth Florence (who introduced Vice President Walter Mondale), and the many other volunteers who helped stage the rally that brought 4,000 people to campus and attention in the national media. Thanks also to alumna Kari Logan, whose public relations firm helped us work with the media. It was a proud day for our college.

This event followed on the heels of another national conversation that Augsburg took part in on Thursday—the Focus the Nation national teach-in, with day-long workshops in various disciplines focusing on finding solutions to climate change, a chapel talk by St. Thomas professor and U.S. Senate Democratic candidate Jack Nelson-Pallmeyer, a lunchtime alumni panel, and an action forum featuring elected officials and environmental activists. Thanks to the Coalition for Student Activism and students in all the organizations involved in planning Augsburg's activities for Focus the Nation.

Listening to the Focus the Nation conversations affirmed how proud I am of the commitments we've made as an institution toward modeling responsible global citizenship and stewardship of our resources. I want to lift up the Environmental Stewardship Committee webpages (http://www.augsburg.edu/green) that highlight our commitments and practices toward a more sustainable campus and city. This work engages us with our neighbors in programs such as Campus Kitchen, feeding the community while supporting local food resources; the HOURCAR parked on campus making available a hybrid-fuel car for short-term travel needs; the subsidized MetroPass program, encouraging the use of public transportation; and the many service projects that engage our students, beginning with City Service Projects Day in September. There is much to be done—as the Focus the Nation sessions so clearly detailed—and I'm very proud of our entire community for its commitment to getting to work on these critical environmental issues.

The new **environmental studies major and minor** is another response to our commitment toward educating for sustainability. This interdisciplinary course of study aims to prepare students to understand and respond from various perspectives to the environmental challenges increasingly facing urban areas.
