On Thursday evening, Lovin's presentation will focus on Niebuhr's views applied to creating global order within current global realities. On Friday morning, Lovin specifically addresses global warming within a geopolitical context. Saturday's talk addresses faith and politics from Niebuhr's perspectives.

Robin Lovin, the Cary McGuire University Professor of Ethics at Southern Methodist University, is a pre-eminent scholar of Reinhold Niebuhr. He also was my teacher at the University of Chicago. I'm grateful that Professor Lovin will be with us to share his views on Niebuhr's continuing significance as applied to issues that we hear debated daily in our news and media. Funds raised for breast cancer research honor Lois Hallcock Johnson '68
Last weekend, Augsburg honored the memory of alumna Lois Hallock Johnson '68 by donating all proceeds from ticket sales at its five home athletic events to the Susan G. Komen Breast Cancer Foundation and a fund for Augsburg women's athletics. Johnson, wife of Augsburg men's hockey assistant coach Bruce Johnson '68, died on November 26 of breast cancer. Their three children—Leah, Thomas, and Aaron—all attended Augsburg. A total of \$2340.79 was split between the Susan G. Komen Foundation and Augsburg Women's Athletics.

Congratulations to the 31 graduates in the physician assistant Class of 2007 for their exemplary performance on the Physician Assistant National Certification Exam (PANCE). Augsburg's mean score of 638 compared to the national mean score of 517, placing the College at least in the top three programs in the country for the third time in the last seven years. The PA program looks forward to hosting an accreditation site team on campus on April 14-15.

Congratulations also to **Brian Krohn '08** for being chosen to present his research, "A Novel Method and Catalyst for Production of Biodiesel," in the Council on Undergraduate Research's Posters on the Hill session to be held April 30 in Washington, D.C. He is one of 70 students selected nationally for this program. Krohn received funding through URGO last summer and has worked with chemistry professor Arlin Gyberg and alumnus Clayton McNeff to develop a unique process to produce biodiesel. Krohn and Gyberg's day on Capitol Hill will also include visits to Minnesota legislators.

Congratulations also to Caryn Quist '09 for her selection as one of approximately 10 students to be accepted into the National Science Foundation Research Experience for Undergraduates (REU) program through the University of Florida for research in France this summer and fall. She has worked on a research team with Arlin Gyberg in chemistry on research that involves discovering a way to grow algae in large scale and extract oil from it to convert into biodiesel fuel. Faculty members Mark Strefeler, Sandra Olmsted, and Joan Kunz wrote letters in her support.



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Kudos to **Dal Liddle**, English, for his essay, "Bakhtinian 'Journalization' and the Mid-Victorian Literary Marketplace," which appears in *Literature Compass*, 4/5 (2007). Liddle, a founding member of the Scholarly Writing Group, had shared his work with the group and considers its publication "another SWG success."

Kudos also to **Doug Green**, English, for his article, "Branagh's Love's Labour's Lost and the Return of the Hollywood Musical: *Song of the Living Dead*," is appearing in Shakespeare Bulletin 26.1 (Winter 2008), published by Johns Hopkins University Press. On January 25, Green participated in a juried literary reading, "Winter Words," at the Northfield Arts Guild; he read his poems "Road Closed" and 'A Visit to Theresienstadt."

Kudos to Nancy Steblay, psychology, who is serving on a five-scientist national team that has received \$586,000 from the JEHT Foundation of New York City, for eyewitness identification experimental field tests. This research is sponsored by a collaboration of two forensic science institutes, the International Association of the Chiefs of Police, and the Innocence Project at Benjamin N. Cardozo School of Law. She also has published two articles and presented at regional and national forums on eyewitness identification.
