I especially want to thank all of our students, faculty, and staff who participated in the 20th Nobel Peace Prize Forum at Concordia College on Friday and Saturday. It was an energetic and meaningful event for all of us, as we heard from noted international activist Greg Mortenson, as well as Columbia University economist Jeffrey Sachs and New York Times columnist Nicholas Kristof. Certainly the highlight of the weekend was the keynote address by 2006 Peace Prize laureate, Muhammad Yunus, whose work with the Grameen Bank on micro-lending and social business is inspiring. What a remarkable opportunity the Nobel Forum is for our community to learn from peacemakers.

I hope you saw news coverage from the press conference on Friday, in which **Augsburg, in** collaboration with SarTec and regent Marie McNeff, announced the discovery of a new process to make biodiesel fuel that can have major impact on our national fuel and energy policies. This discovery came about through the initial research of senior Brian Krohn and developed through the collaboration of chemistry professor Arlin Gyberg and Augsburg alum Clayton McNeff, with his team of scientists. Thanks to David Warch, Jodi Collen, and alum Kari Logan, with her public relations firm, who coordinated the press conference that attracted print and TV media, plus other industry publications. Finally, I also want to thank all of you who participated in the Sustainability Conference, held on campus on Saturday. Neighborhood volunteer teams and individuals attended to learn how to plan projects that reduce global warming and adapt to climate change. Speakers included Minneapolis mayor R.T. Rybak, St. Paul mayor Chris Coleman, and Hennepin County commissioner Peter McLaughlin.

This week, I encourage students to participate in the Minnesota Private College Council's Day at the Capitol. Each year, MPCC organizes opportunities for students to meet with our local legislators to talk about financial aid, specifically the Minnesota State Grant program, and share with them how critical the aid is to their educational resources. Students receive information on student aid issues and lobbying tips before they attend meetings with the legislators.

Augsburg students join students from Concordia and Hamline at the Capitol on Wednesday, from 10:15 a.m. to 2 p.m. There is no cost, and transportation and lunch are provided. I encourage all students, plus faculty, staff, and parents who are interested, to participate in this important opportunity to advocate for access to our state's education. Nobel Peace Prize Forum Scholars named

Congratulations to juniors Hannah Glusenkamp and Willie Pinckney, who were named among the first Nobel Peace Prize Forum Scholars. This new PPF program selects two students from each of the five sponsoring colleges—Augsburg, Augustana (Sioux Falls), Concordia, Luther, and St. Olaf—who will travel together on a summer seminar, lead peace activities on their campuses, and present at the next spring's Peace Prize Forum. The goal of the program is to develop student leaders inspired to careers or lifelong interests in world peace issues.

Pinckney and Glusenkamp will travel to Guatemala in August on a 10-day intensive seminar sponsored by CGE to study Guatemala's post-conflict experience with the 1996 Peace Accords, and to highlight themes and issues to be discussed in next year's Peace Prize Forum.

Kemper Foundation grant for student leadership development

Augsburg has received a grant of \$50,000 for 2008 from the Kemper Foundation to develop a summer undergraduate leadership seminar for 10 students with paid internships in community organizations, to help them connect liberal arts and leadership with careers and citizenship.
