Rick Steves lecture on Nov. 9

Noted travel expert and public television host Rick Steves will speak at Augsburg on Friday at 11 a.m. in Hoversten Chapel. His visit to Augsburg comes in connection with the Center for Global Education's 25th anniversary celebration this year.

Steves' talk is titled "Travel as a Political Act," about how travel has changed his perspectives on the United States' role in the world. He has traveled on three trips organized by CGE, and considers them among the best travel experiences he has enjoyed.

In its 25 years, the Center for Global Education has hosted more than 10,000 people in semester and short-term programs in more than 40 countries around the world. It was a pioneer in creating programs that educate participants about issues and people in local communities, primarily those who are not represented in mainstream media. In 2003, CGE was recognized by the National Society for Experiential Education as its Program of the Year.

Reaffirmation of Accreditation for BSW and MSW

At its October meeting the Commission on Accreditation of the Council on Social Work Education (CSWE) voted to reaffirm Augsburg's MSW and BSW combined program accreditation for eight years, the maximum period allowed. The successful reaffirmation of accreditation of both programs is the culmination of a self-study process that covered a two-year period, including the development of three volumes of narrative and supporting documents, a three-day site visit last April from leading social work educators from across the country, and the deliberation and review by the Commission.

Congratulations to department chair, Tony Bibus, and the entire Social Work Department on this excellent news from CSWE, and thank you for the department's important contributions to teaching and learning.

Congratulations to **Tom Ruffaner, Custodial Services, who has been awarded the Individual Achievement Commuter Choice Award by MetroTransit Rideshare**.
