Kudos to the **Day Admissions staff** for a terrific round of college fairs hosted by MNACC (Minnesota Association of Counselors of Color.) Typically, Augsburg has garnered a few dozen inquiries from these events at area high schools, but last month's MNACC fairs resulted in more than 600 inquiries! This significant interest in Augsburg can be attributed to the relationship-building and networking in Twin Cities high schools that the admissions counselors and others have been developing in recent years.

Kudos also to the **Honors Program** for the first issue of the renamed and revised Augsburg Honors Review (AHR). This student-run publication of undergraduate scholarship receives submissions of undergraduate research papers and selects the best through a double-blind peer review process. The selected papers undergo a rigorous editorial process in which student authors work with expert advisers and a student editor to check the article for accuracy, quality, and style, making Augsburg's Review one of the most rigorous in the country.
