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Good morning. It was a great weekend at Augsburg as we welcomed prospective scholarship students to campus for the annual President's and Fine Arts Scholarships Weekend. It is always gratifying to meet these very talented high school students (and their families) and to learn of their aspirations for their lives and why they believe Augsburg is the right place for them. My thanks especially to our day admissions staff who led the planning and to all those who helped make this weekend successful.

At the end of this week **we host the annual Batalden Seminar in Applied Ethics**, this year considering issues of Christianity and ecology. Professor Larry Rasmussen returns to Augsburg and, through his lens as a social ethicist, will lead us in conversations around consumption, ecology, and faith. He will speak three times—Thursday evening, Friday morning, and Saturday noon—I hope you will join these conversations. See the calendar for details on Professor Rasmussen's talks and titles.

This convocation is planned as part of the work of nursing professor **Ruth Enestvedt**, who serves as Augsburg's **Batalden Scholar in Applied Ethics**. Much of her work has involved engaging the community in discussions of applied ethics. During the fall, she initiated conversations in the Augsburg and wider communities around ethics and hunger. The graduate course she developed and is currently teaching, Making Room at the Table: Applying Ethics to Ending Hunger and Sharing Food, approaches these issues from interdisciplinary perspectives.

I am most happy to report that **we have received the The Higher Learning Commission's Systems Appraisal Feedback Report, which is an important component of the seven-year accreditation cycle** within the Academic Quality Improvement Program (AQIP). We celebrated the College's Reaffirmation of Accreditation in 2007 after successfully completing our first cycle of review. This mission-based approach to accreditation casts an important light on what we are doing each day as a college community to keep the Augsburg promise and plan for the future of this great institution.

The systems appraisal review process, which is conducted every four years by a team of trained evaluators, is designed to provide the College with feedback on strengths and opportunities for improvement that we can use as a framework for campus conversations about the way we do our work and engage each other in planning for our future. The Systems Appraisal Feedback Report and the November 2008 Systems Portfolio and Index on which the report is based, are available for your review on Augsburg's AQIP webpage: www.augsburg.edu/aqip/. It is important to note that the review team concluded that Augsburg presented evidence that we are complying with the Five Criteria for Accreditation—very good news indeed!



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Next fall a team led by Dean Farley will attend a strategy forum in Chicago that will build on campus conversations about the Systems Appraisal Feedback Report. An oncampus AQIP Quality Check-Up conducted by a two-person team will follow in 2010. The Higher Learning Commission's seven-year Reaffirmation of Accreditation decision is based on the body of evidence over that period of time of the College's overall pattern of improvement. I want to express my gratitude to the campus community for all you do to make our continuing accreditation possible.
