Changes in cleaning schedule

As of May 18, Custodial Services began providing cleaning services on campus primarily during the day, instead of after hours and overnight. Not only will this provide considerable cost savings, but it enables the night shift cleaning crew to more actively participate in the campus community. Among the costs savings are reduction of overtime and differential shift wages and reduction of lights and electricity needed overnight. A larger daytime crew will be able to focus greater attention on needs that arise during the day on campus. Summer maintenance/repair projects

The following projects will be carried out during the summer, coordinated with the normal flow of general facilities day-to-day maintenance operational issues.

- Music Hall—replacing a major component of the building's AC system (completion date, July 3)
- Mortensen and Urness Halls—repairing the concrete portion of the exterior shell (Aug. 28)
- Christensen Center—renovation of four restrooms on third and second floors (Aug. 28)
- Music Hall—replace the building roof (July 28)
- Sverdrup Hall—replace the building roof (Aug. 1)
- Skyway between Music and Memorial—replace the building roof (Aug. 1)
- Campus hardscape—annual replacement of damaged concrete (Aug. 28)
- Campus carpeting—annual replacement allotment of carpeting throughout parts of campus (Aug. 28)
- EPA self audit—completing a campuswide self audit to comply with EPA Zone V upcoming initiative (Aug. 1)
- 2011 6th Street property—demolition of property in preparation for CSBR project (Sept. 4)
- Resident spaces—complete apartment turns in preparation for each of the 1,000 residents for fall 2009 start up (Aug. 28)
- Facilities work order system—complete the implementation process for a totally paperless system (July 31)
- Ice Arena A—rehab the surface underlayment and re-install ice surface (June 22)
- Campus grounds—complete annual preparation of landscape features, planting beds, gardens, bio-retention ponds, etc. (Aug. 28)

Summer events on campus

Many meetings, workshops, camps, seminars, and other events will take place on campus during the next three months. A sampling of them includes:

- Augsburg Advantage at St. Kate's Summer Transition program—a five-week program for 16 students who have been studying in a skills program at St. Kate's. They are taking a Summer Session I course on campus and will continue at Augsburg in the fall semester. May 24—June 24
- Minnesota Private College Week—prospective high school students and their parents visit Augsburg during the week for tours and information. June 22–26
- Urban Debate League. July 5–25
- Summer Bridge—a five-week residential program for 25 admitted first-year Augsburg students who are TRiO/SSS eligible. Students take two courses, attend academic support seminars, workshops, and enjoy other social and cultural activities. July 6–Aug. 7
- GEMS/GISE program (Girls in Engineering, Mathematics, and Science) and GISE (Guys in Science and Engineering)—Middle- and high-school girls and boys from Minneapolis Public Schools on campus, with Augsburg student mentors working with them. This year, GEMS/GISE and Augsburg will also cosponsor and host the SciFY (Science for Youth) Girls and SciFY Boys of St. Paul Public Schools. In total, 320 middle school and high school students will be on campus in July. GEMS/GISE, July 6–30 and SciFY, July 6–23
