Good morning. A very warm welcome to everyone in this new academic year, Augsburg College's 140th year. I especially welcome our first-year and transfer students, our new faculty and staff, plus all returning students and members of the Augsburg community.

Even as we enjoy glorious weather for our Auggie Days activities, however, we keep the people on the Gulf Coast in our thoughts and prayers as they face the force and destruction of Hurricane Gustav.

The academic year kicks off tomorrow morning, Tuesday, with the **Opening Convocation for day students at 10:30 a.m. in Hoversten Chapel**. In our Auggie tradition, first-year students will process into the chapel to the applause of welcoming faculty (which is followed by a similar tradition as graduating students march to Melby Hall through lines of cheering faculty). Sociology professor Lars Christiansen, 2008 recipient of the Center for Teaching and Learning's Distinguished Contributions Award for Excellence in Teaching, will speak at the Convocation.

Another truly Augsburg tradition takes place Tuesday afternoon as **more than 500 of us—first-years, Orientation Leaders, faculty, and the President's Cabinet—visit 23 sites (18 of them in walking distance of campus), for City Service Projects Day**. I look forward to accompanying an AugSem group to Waite House, a human services and community center in the Phillips neighborhood. Other projects include painting a mural with Trinity Congregation in Cedar-Riverside, working at the Bedlam Theatre, and caring for Augsburg's community garden.

Next weekend begins our Augsburg for Adults fall trimester, with adult undergraduate and graduate students beginning their classes. Once again, we will host Welcome Weekend, with faculty, staff, and students volunteering to welcome new and continuing students and help them find their classes. **The weekend Opening Convocation will take place on Saturday, Sept. 6, at noon, in Hoversten Chapel**, following the same program as Tuesday's convocation.

Our participation in **The Washington Center's internship seminar for the Republican National Convention** has added to the activity of opening week this year. Augsburg was chosen to host this seminar—with 120 students from around the country attending, including 20 Augsburg students. Each morning, Monday through Thursday this week, from 9 a.m. to noon, speakers who are connected to the convention will make presentations on campus, which are open to the public at no cost. Finally, as our chapel services begin again, I want to draw your attention to the importance of chapel in Augsburg's life and mission. This is a time for us as a

community—Sabbath time—in which we can choose to attend the chapel service or to worship or reflect in another way. I ask all offices to remain closed during chapel time as a sign of our common purpose.

We meet in chapel on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from 10:20 to 10:40 a.m., followed by 20 minutes of community time; on Tuesday and Thursday from 11:20 to 11:40 a.m.; and on Saturdays of weekend classes. An informal communion is held each Wednesday evening at 9:30 p.m. I draw your attention to the list of chapel speakers and programs in the calendar each week.
