Good morning. We began this past week as a deeply saddened community, with news of the death of our student and friend Ahmednur Ali, who was fatally shot Monday evening as he left his volunteer work at the Brian Coyle Community Center. We gathered together as a campus community and as a neighborhood community to grieve his death and seek to understand how we can stay safe even as we are engaged in the city.

On Thursday, we co-hosted a community meeting at the Brian Coyle Center, along with Pillsbury United Communities, the Confederation of Somali Organizations, and the Oromo Community, to address specific community concerns in the Currie Park/Brian Coyle Center area. We will continue to participate actively in these conversations.

We also will continue to offer opportunities for our college community to gather and grieve this loss of a colleague and this wound to our work as a college in the city.

I hope you were able to take part in the activities of Homecoming—from the kick-off fireworks pep rally on Monday evening to the block party on Saturday afternoon. Congratulations to the Auggie football team for their formidable 49-21 win over St. Olaf, to a standing-room-only crowd. It was a great game!

We also held the inaugural public event for the new Sabo Center for Citizenship and Learning—which offered all of us a vision for bipartisan political work. Thanks to Martin Sabo '59 and Sabo professor Garry Hesser for leading this effort.

I especially enjoyed participating in the PBJ sandwich contest on Friday afternoon! For this service project, organized by the Event and Conference Planning office along with Campus Kitchen, we prepared approximately 830 sandwiches (330 above the goal!) for the Secure Waiting Homeless Shelter in downtown Minneapolis. Thanks to all who participated—Cabinet, Marketing and Communication, Event and Conference Planning, StepUP, Psychology Department, Admissions/Welcome Desk, Campus Ministry, and the football team.

On Thursday and Friday of this week, we welcome the Board of Regents to campus for their fall meeting. The theme for this board meeting is "Learning to Learn," a topic that will explore Augsburg's core and general education curriculum. This is the first of four themes for this year's board meetings that provide an overview of Augsburg's distinctive academic programs.

On Thursday evening, we honor and celebrate the contributions of seven regents who have concluded their board service this year at a dinner at the Science Museum in St. Paul. Our deepest appreciation goes to Rev. Gary Benson, Ted Grindal, and Ron Nelson, who completed 12 years (two terms) on the board; Mike Freeman and Bev Oren

Christensen Symposium launches Convocation Series

Augsburg's Convocation Series, "Many Voices, Bold Visions," presents opportunities throughout the year to hear from leaders and visionaries and join in conversation around the power of vision.

The Christensen Symposium is the first event in the series and was established by an endowment in 1990 honoring former Augsburg president Bernhard M. Christensen. The symposium reflects and reinforces his commitment to academic integrity, the Christian Gospel, and a mutually supportive relationship with the church community.

The five lessons we learn from Bernhard M. Christensen include:

- Christian faith liberates minds and lives
- Diversity strengthens vital communities
- Interfaith friendships enrich learning
- The love of Christ draws us to God
- We are called to service in the world

Next Monday and Tuesday, Martha E. Stortz, professor of historical theology and ethics at Pacific Lutheran Theological Seminary/Graduate Theological Union, will present the Christensen Symposium lectures on Monday evening at 7:30 p.m. and Tuesday morning at 11 a.m. Monday's topic is "Costly Discipleship: Forgiveness as a Practice," and on Tuesday, she speaks on "Costly Citizenship: Regarding the Other in a Culture of Fear."
