

President's WEEKLY UPDATE

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Good morning. I am pleased to take part tomorrow evening in the **10th anniversary of Augsburg's program in Rochester**. The Rochester campus has represented significant growth to our non-traditional adult programs. Founded by its former director, Rick Thoni, in conversations with regent Ruth Johnson and others, it began as a way to offer completion degrees for nurses at Mayo Clinic. Starting with 63 students in 1998, our program has grown to 250 in the undergraduate program, with more than 125 students currently enrolled in graduate courses. The program offers bachelor's degrees in business and management information systems, communication studies, education, and nursing; and master's programs in education, nursing, and business.

The Open House will take place at Rochester's campus at Bethel Lutheran Church, 810 3rd Ave. SE from 6:30 to 8 p.m. A short program begins at 7 p.m., including comments from Barbara Farley, Rick Thoni, and myself.

I hope that faculty and staff on our Minneapolis campus will join us for the monthly Community Time on Tuesday at 3:45 p.m. in East Commons. This month's meeting will feature presentations from representatives of the United Way and Community Shares programs and will kick off our annual workplace campaign for these two important community efforts. Especially in these volatile economic times, United Way and Community Shares are providing much-needed assistance to the most vulnerable in our region. For those of us who are fortunate to have enough, I commend our participation in the United Way and Community Shares campaigns. I am pleased to support both.

On Friday, in the Quad at 11:15 following the convocation, I look forward to receiving the 95 Theses from Student Government. This will be the 491st anniversary of Martin Luther's posting of his 95 Theses on the Castle Church door in Wittenberg, Germany on Oct. 31, 1517. This is the fourth year that Student Government has celebrated Reformation Day by sharing their concerns and ideas with the Augsburg community in this way.
