Good morning. Welcome back to staff and faculty who return this week after the holiday break. I hope you were able to enjoy your planned holiday celebrations with family and friends despite the winter storms that swept across the country. This weekend we welcome Weekend College and most graduate students back to classes to begin winter trimester. Rochester classes and MBA classes for returning students begin this evening. Next Monday day students start spring semester classes.

Also beginning this evening are classes at our Bloomington Center, located at St. Stephen Lutheran Church on France Ave. near I-494. Last year at this time we began graduate classes in the MBA program there, and tonight we are adding the Master of Arts in Leadership program in a structure and schedule that is modified from the weekend format used on the Minneapolis campus.

On Thursday, a newly-developed AA to BA program begins in Bloomington that meets the needs of Normandale Community College graduates who desire a structured path to degree completion. Students can choose either a business administration major or an organizational communication major with a business administration minor. Cohorts will meet one night a week, and most students will be able to complete the program in nine trimesters.

I want to give special thanks to Bruce Rowe and his grounds crew for their hard work before Christmas and on Christmas Eve during the massive snowstorm, as they quickly cleared streets and sidewalks to make the campus safer and more accessible for everyone who was here.

It was with great sadness that I learned last Monday of the death of our colleague Donald Steinmetz, who has taught in our Languages and Cross-Cultural Studies Department for 41 years. His son, Erik, is a member of the Computer Science Department, and our prayers are with Erik and his family during this difficult time. Arrangements are being made for a memorial service to be held at Augsburg later this month; information will be posted in the Weekly Update.

The women's basketball team played in the Wartburg Tournament on December 29–30, losing the final consolation game, 63–49, to University of Wisconsin-Platteville.
