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Good morning. It was a grand commencement weekend, as we honored nearly 400 day program undergraduates and 28 physician assistant master's degree students. Our graduates heard inspiring words about civic engagement from commencement speaker Governor Tim Pawlenty, from honorary degree recipient Father Fernando Cardenal from Nicaragua, and from student speaker Nou Chang '10.

The 2010 Marina Christensen Justice Award was presented to Jessica Spanswick, whose remarkable list of achievements reflects a deep commitment to service—engaging in environmental issues here on campus and in southern Africa, in studying social justice and peacemaking in Mexico, and in tutoring in our own Cedar-Riverside neighborhood.

Nou Chang, a biology and English major, who spoke on behalf of the Class of 2010, talked about how civic engagement is integrated into everyday life at Augsburg and how for her it means also being active and involved outside of Augsburg—locally and globally. The Augsburg College Board of Regents met for its spring meeting on Friday, April 30. Among its actions taken were approval of the 2010-11 operating budget for the College and of changes to the Faculty Handbook having to do with criteria for tenure and promotion.

Perhaps the board's most momentous action was approval of a new mission statement for Augsburg College. The culmination of nearly two years of conversation with faculty, staff, students, alumni, and board members, the new mission statement reflects the strong historic values of Augsburg while at the same time recognizing the changing reality of the College's expanding academic programs and sites. The new statement reads:

"Augsburg College educates students to be informed citizens, thoughtful stewards, critical thinkers, and responsible leaders. The Augsburg experience is supported by an engaged community that is committed to intentional diversity in its life and work. An Augsburg education is defined by excellence in the liberal arts and professional studies, guided by the faith and values of the Lutheran Church, and shaped by its urban and global settings."

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Changes to the Minneapolis Room
