

President's WEEKLY UPDATE

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Good morning. Today I join the members of the Executive Committee of the Nobel Peace Prize Forum at their meeting, at the same time that Augsburg is preparing to host the 2010 Nobel Peace Prize Forum that will take place on campus, March 5-6. We are honored and delighted that 2008 Nobel Peace Laureate Martti Ahtisaari, peace negotiator and former president of Finland, has accepted our invitation to participate in the forum.

Orv Gingerich, assistant vice president of international programs, and Frankie Shackelford, professor and chair of modern languages and cross-cultural studies, are cochairs of Augsburg's planning committee, which is at work planning our upcoming forum. I look forward to sharing updates with you as it moves forward.

On Wednesday, I'll meet with the Minnesota Private College Council Board of Directors, of which I serve as chair this year. Following this meeting, the council will honor the work of retiring president David Laird, who has been a strong friend to Augsburg. David's commitment to access and excellence in Minnesota's private higher education community is exemplary—and is shared by his spouse, Joanne, who is a proud 1958 graduate of Augsburg and a faithful member of the Augsburg Associates.

As I mentioned last week, several of us were in Washington, D.C. last Monday for a reception to honor Martin and Sylvia Sabo and to share the work of the Sabo Center for Citizenship and Learning. It was a joyful gathering, attended by many Augsburg alums and friends from the D.C. area. Special guests included Minnesota senators Amy Klobuchar and Al Franken, who both spoke with deep passion about Martin's legacy of public service and the great opportunity Augsburg has to share that legacy with its current and future students.

350 International Day of Climate Action

Augsburg students led bikers to the State Capitol for a 350 rally on the Capitol lawn, sponsored by the Will Steger Foundation, Oxfam, 1Sky, and Augsburg in support of global climate change action. Rep. Betty McCollum and Rep. Keith Ellison, among other legislators, told those gathered to "keep your voices loud."

The bikers arrived back on campus in time to join a crowd at halftime on the football field for a photo for 350.org., the organization led by Bill McKibben that strives to bring about a reduction of carbon emissions to 350 ppm, deemed the highest safe level by NASA scientists.
