Good morning. As you read this, I am in Moscow, where Professor Magda Paleczny-Zapp and I begin meetings to plan for our new graduate certificate program and opportunities for our MBA program.

About the same time I left campus, a group of alumni and staff returned from two weeks in Italy, where they traveled with art professor Kristin Anderson studying the history, culture, and art of that region. This is one example of the wonderful alumni travel opportunities for continued learning with our faculty, who enjoy sharing their expertise and passions. I look forward to hearing about the Italy trip.

I am very pleased to announce that **The Higher Learning Commission has approved Augsburg College to offer its first doctoral degree, Doctor of Nursing Practice**, which was approved by our Board of Regents last January. This approval culminates a great deal of work by the Department of Nursing over the past two years. Congratulations to all involved.

This professional practice doctorate will build on the strengths of our Bachelor of Science in Nursing (BSN) and the Master of Arts in Nursing (MAN) programs. It provides a venue for the development of nursing students prepared to enter generalist and advanced transcultural nursing practice in the 21st century.

Wednesday evening is the first of this year's screenings of films in the Native American Film Series. The film, *Mato Paha: Rally to Protect Bear Butte*, documents the clashes between cultures over the use of land held sacred by Native peoples. The screening is at 7 p.m., in Sateren Auditorium, followed by questions and discussion. Our film series, now in its sixth year, has provided venues and opportunities for Native filmmakers to present their work and open discussion of Native cultural values and contemporary issues of social justice.

I'd like to remind you that **this is the last week to make contributions to the 2009 fall giving campaigns for United Way and Community Shares.** This is another example of how Augsburg gives back to the community, supporting organizations that provide critical assistance to those most vulnerable and in need. Augsburg will honor former coach and instructor Ed Saugestad '59 on Saturday with a special celebration at Jeroy Carlson A-Club Suite in Kennedy Center at 6 p.m. This will follow the men's hockey game against Concordia-Wisconsin at 2 p.m. and the men's hockey alumni celebration at 4:30 p.m.

Ed coached the Augsburg men's hockey team from 1958 to 1996, winning six straight MIAC titles and three NAIA national championships. In addition, he served on the Augsburg football coaching staff, including two years (1970-71) as head coach. He taught in the Health and Physical Education Department throughout his career, and served as Augsburg's men's athletic director from 1981-87.
