PRESIDENT'S VIEWS

I am writing this week from the 98th annual meeting of the Lutheran Educational Conference of North America (LECNA), where the presidents of the Lutheran colleges and universities in the U.S. and Canada are gathered for engagement, fellowship, and learning. The presidents of the ELCA colleges also have the opportunity during our meetings to spend time with Presiding Bishop Mark Hanson '68, who is a fierce proponent of Lutheran higher education at our institutions.

I also am enjoying time with Augsburg alumni and friends at a series of events in Florida, California, and Arizona during early February. I am so grateful for the abiding loyalty and generosity of our graduates and am always glad to learn what is happening in their lives.

Last weekend, the Augsburg Board of Regents met for their winter meetings. Among the highlights of the meetings were:

- A strategic discussion of the ways in which the plans for the Center for Science, Business and Religion are promoting rich conversations on and off-campus about how the integration of science, business, and religion is central to our educational work and to more and more aspects of life in the world.
- Affirmation of tenure and promotion for 10 Augsburg faculty members, effective September 1, 2011:

Bi-weekly payroll cycle reminders

The campus recently transitioned to a bi-weekly payroll cycle for all employees. Active employees received their first bi-weekly paycheck on January 14, along with a wallet-size payroll calendar for 2011. This change will improve efficiency, reporting, and budgeting; and employees have been very supportive and patient with this necessary change. In addition, all College staff members are now on the online time system in keeping with our efforts toward a more efficient, more eco-friendly work place. While the electronic submittal is easier and quicker than paper records, it is still the official time sheet and carries the same requirements of accuracy and honesty. All supervisors are required to review and approve their employees' time records by 2 p.m. on Tuesday. By submitting the records electronically, both the employee and supervisor are stating that the work hours and time off are accurate and are approved for payment.
