Minneapolis Mayor R.T. Rybak will deliver his "State of the City" address at Augsburg in Hoversten Chapel tomorrow at 11 a.m. All are welcome to attend.

2011 Peace Prize Forum at Luther College

Auggie students filled a bus for the trip to Decorah for the Peace Prize Forum. Current Peace Prize Forum Scholars Katherine Edelen and Mai Yer Vang participated in the workshops, as the Peace Scholars reported on their year's activities.

During the event, announcements were made about the changes to the forum beginning next year when it relocates to the Twin Cities, to be organized by Augsburg College and the Humphrey Institute at the University of Minnesota. Maureen Reed, who has served as a member of the Nobel Peace Prize Forum Executive Committee, was announced as the new executive director of the forum. The 2012 Peace Prize Forum will take place next spring and honor 2010 Peace Laureate and poet Liu Xiaobo.

2011–12 Peace Scholars are announced

Augsburg's two new Peace Scholars for 2011–12 are Claire Bergren and Sonja Blackstone Kjerland. In summer 2011, the Peace Scholars will study in Norway at the International Summer School, University of Oslo. Their program will intersect with the work of Norwegian peace organizations, including the Nobel Institute, to deepen understanding of issues related to peace, justice, democracy, and human rights.

Claire Bergren is a junior majoring in political science with a minor in peace and global studies. She has been active in Student Government and Orientation, and is a Bonner Scholar. Sonja Blackstone Kjerland is a junior transfer student who is majoring in secondary education, with a concentration in social studies. She participated in the Think Outside the Bottle campaign to reduce waste and is a member of the Augsburg Choir.

Foodless Food Drive during March

As part of Minnesota Food Share's March campaign each year, Augsburg holds a "foodless food drive" to fill the food shelf at the Brian Coyle Community Center. This year's goal is to raise \$3,000, which represents the amount needed to distribute food for one month to Cedar-Riverside residents.

Collecting money rather than food allows for the advantages in bulk buying, as well as for targeting the exact foods the community needs—each \$10 donation translates to \$40 of food for the shelf. This year's foodless food drive is organized by a Project Management class as a service-learning project with assistance from the Sabo Center for Citizenship and Learning. Many students took part in Student Philanthropy Week, sharing how they give back through volunteering in community groups and student organizations. The week-long event was sponsored by the Office of Alumni and Constituent Relations and supported by the Augsburg Stewards.

The "Feed the Pig" campaign was won by the Class of 2014, although the results were close most of the week and not clear until the final tallies. A total of \$844.28 was raised from 195 donations from faculty, staff, and students, with all the funds going toward student scholarships through The Augsburg Fund. More Auggies in the national spotlight

Congratulations to Auggies on the team that developed the Mcgyan Process, which was issued a U.S. patent on March 1, after a review process of more than three-and-a-half years. The Mcgyan Process is a chemical process that converts plant oils and animal fats to biodiesel fuel. It was initiated by the research of then-Augsburg student **Brian Krohn '08**, who, together with Chemistry Professor **Arlin Gyberg**, contacted **Clayton McNeff '91** at SarTec Corporation, whose team then developed the process.
