### **Foodless Food Drive during March**

As part of Minnesota Food Share's March campaign each year, Augsburg holds a "foodless food drive" to fill the food shelf at the Brian Coyle Community Center. This year's goal is to raise \$3,000, which represents the amount needed to distribute food for one month to Cedar-Riverside residents.

Collecting money rather than food allows for the advantages in bulk buying, as well as for targeting the exact foods the community needs—each \$10 donation translates to \$40 of food for the shelf. This year's foodless food drive is organized by a Project Management class as a service-learning project with assistance from the Sabo Center for Citizenship and Learning.

The students will table in Christensen Center tomorrow, Tuesday, from 11:30 a.m.-1:30 p.m. where contributions may be made. All cash and checks (made out to Brian Coyle Foodshelf) can also be sent to the Sabo Center, CB 108.

### Congratulations to Auggies at nationals!

Congratulations to **the Auggie wrestlers** and head coach Mark Matzek for their runnerup finish in the NCAA Division III national championship—the 23rd straight year the team has finished in the top four. Senior **Zach Molitor** finished his collegiate career with a national championship at 174 lbs. The team also claims the fifth-highest GPA in the nation.

Senior **Nick Ward** was the only MIAC sprinter who competed in the men's 55-meter dash at the NCAA Division III national track and field meet at Capital University. While he ran the ninth-fastest time, it was .001 second short of qualifying for the final field.
