Good morning. Welcome to everyone as we begin the fall term in Augsburg's 142nd academic year. On Saturday, we welcomed first-year day students (and their families) as they moved into the residence halls, and today we welcome back our returning students.

Tomorrow morning at 10:30 a.m., we officially recognize our first-year day students in Auggie tradition, as they process into Hoversten Chapel to the applause of faculty lined up to greet them, for the Opening Convocation. This practice is repeated at Commencement, when graduating students march through lines of faculty applauding their achievements and wishing them well, as they make their way to the Commencement ceremony.

English professor Bob Cowgill, recipient of the 2010 Excellence in Teaching Award, will speak to the new class in a talk titled "Your Book in My Hands: Prospero's Library in the Digital Age."

Following the convocation, all faculty, staff, and students are invited to lunch on the Quad with first-year students and orientation leaders who will then disperse around the neighborhoods and into St. Paul to carry out City Service Day projects—watch for our grey and light green T-shirts! The President's Cabinet members will join several AugSem groups; I will be doing gardening work with AugSem I and Professor Phil Adamo at Dowling Urban Environmental School in Minneapolis.

Fall trimester classes begin on Friday evening. On both Friday evening and Saturday morning, Augsburg faculty, staff, and student leaders will welcome new and returning students as they arrive on campus. All faculty, staff, and students are welcome at the Augsburg for Adults Opening Picnic on the Quad, 11:45 a.m.—1:15 p.m. (East Commons in Christensen Center, in case of rain).

This fall, classes begin for Augsburg students in five locations:

- Main campus (Minneapolis)—Fall semester day classes begin on Wednesday; fall trimester weekend and graduate classes begin on Friday.
- Rochester campus (Bethel Lutheran Church)—Fall trimester classes begin tomorrow evening, September 7.
- Bloomington (St. Stephen Lutheran Church)—Undergraduate AA to BA classes begin Thursday evening, September 9; MAL and MBA classes begin Monday, September 13.
- Thrivent Financial (downtown Minneapolis)—MBA classes begin tomorrow evening, September 7.
- United Hospital (St. Paul)—Classes for fall trimester undergraduate nursing students begin Monday evening, September 13.

Enjoy the opening week celebrations—I hope you will join me in chapel on Wednesday, as our daily chapel services begin once again.

Augsburg welcomes 35 new international students this fall—8 first-year students from 8 countries, a graduate student from Poland in the Master of Nursing program, and 27 students from Augsburg's partner institutions in China, Germany, and Norway who will study at Augsburg for one or two semesters. Last week, Wednesday through Friday, the students participated in international student orientation.

Community forums and gatherings

I am pleased to remind the Augsburg community of various ways by which we build community, learn what is happening on campus, and honor the mission of Augsburg.

<u>Daily chapel time</u>—I especially want to draw your attention to the importance of daily chapel in Augsburg's life and mission. This is a time for us as a community—Sabbath time—in which we step back from our normal duties to gather for worship or to reflect in another way. I remind staff and faculty that all offices are to remain closed during chapel time as a sign of our common purpose.

We meet in chapel on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday from 10:20 to 10:40 a.m., followed by 20 minutes of community time; on Tuesday and Thursday from 11:20 to 11:40 a.m.; and on Saturdays of weekend classes for First Word Gathering at 7:30 a.m. An informal communion is held Wednesday evenings at 9:09 p.m. I draw your attention to the list of chapel speakers and programs in the calendar below and on the Inside Augsburg calendar. It is sacred time for us to spend together each day.

<u>Community Time</u>—These gatherings, held in the late afternoon of the last Tuesday of the month, support our commitment to building community and practicing common work. This is also an opportunity to get to know one another, exchange ideas, and collaborate in new ways. The first Community Time for the fall semester will be held on Tuesday, Sept. 28, at 3:45 p.m., in East Commons, Christensen Center. (Open to all members of the community)

First Year @ Augsburg Online Workshop

The Augsburg for Adults office (in collaboration with Academic Advising, the Academic Skills Office, Lindell Library, Information Technology, and the Strommen Career and Internship Center) is launching a three-week "First Year @ Augsburg Online Workshop" for new Weekend College students. This optional workshop will provide students with resources and information about becoming a successful student, while building a community of support.

Planning events on campus

Thanks to the good work over the past few months by a task force led by Jodi Collen, Event and Conference Planning, and John Pack, Public Safety, we have now guidelines for better managing and applying resources to events held on campus that are planned by external organizations. Task force on privacy

Last year, I appointed an ad hoc task force on privacy and charged it with conducting a review of privacy policies applicable to our faculty, staff, and students in the context of alignment with the College's values, adherence to legal and policy standards, and consistency across the College, and to make recommendations to me concerning the need for possible revisions. I want to express my appreciation to Professor Bob Groven, who chaired this group, and to the other task force members: Professor Phil Adamo; staff members Brad Christ, David Draus, and Bill Wittenbreer; and student senate representatives Juve Meza-Rodriguez and Lily Morris. I received the final report of the task force in June and have asked various members of my leadership team to follow up on several key recommendations. Later this fall, I will report back to you about the implementation of these recommendations.

Center for Global Education updates

• The Center for Global Education received its fourth Fulbright-Hays Group Projects Abroad grant from the U.S. Department of Education, International Programs Service. Dee Vodicka, Education Department; Mary Dillon, student; and Desman Oakley '01, Augsburg alumnus, participated with nine other educators in a curriculum

- development group project under leadership from Urbanus Dax, CGE site director in Namibia and Shamani Shikwambi, assistant professor of education, Macon State University.
- Welcome back to the 5 faculty, 5 staff, and 10 students who participated in the
 Hoversten Peace Seminar with CGE. The 2010 travel seminar focused on "Migration
 and Globalization: Engaging Our Communities" in Cuernavaca, Mexico, July 31–Aug. 8.
- The **2010 Peace Prize Forum Peace Scholars**, Mai Yer Vang and Katie Edelen, enrolled in the Oslo University International Summer School with eight other peace scholars from the Nobel Peace Prize Forum college consortium. In addition to a regular summer school course, the students participated in a peace seminar focused on the unique and varied ways Norwegian individuals and organizations contribute to global peace-building efforts.

Recent grants to Augsburg

- The U.S. Department of Education has awarded \$1.4 million over five years for the **Student Support Services/TRiO Program** with 160 students participating annually. This is the third SSS/TRiO grant Augsburg has received. Aly Olson is the project director.
- Augsburg is one of 14 colleges/universities collaborating with the International Center
 for Service-Learning in Teacher Education at Duke University and the National Council
 for Accreditation of Teacher Education on a three-year project for pre-service teacher
 education. The project will provide \$80,000 for project activities; Joe Erickson, project
 director.
- The Minnesota Department of Education, with funds provided by the U.S. Department of Education, has awarded \$604,000 over three years for the 21st Century Learning Center located on the west side of St. Paul. Derek Johnson, Center for Democracy and Citizenship, project director.
- Augsburg has received several grants from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (stimulus funds). Grants include additional work-study funds for students, research funding in physics, and equipment in physics. The total awarded thus far is \$1,354,269. Mark Engebretson and David Murr, principal investigators.
- The National Science Foundation has awarded grants for research, instrumentation, and course design to Dave Hanson, Ben Stottrup, David Murr, and Mark Engebretson, through annual competitions. Total of recent awards is \$1,023,707.

Welcoming our President's Circle members

Last Thursday, I was pleased to join with the Institutional Advancement staff to welcome 65 members of our President's Circle to breakfast on campus and have the opportunity to update them on news about the College. The President's Circle, with a total of 363 members, supports Augsburg with gifts of \$1,000 or more each year. The leadership they provide in annual giving has enabled The Augsburg Fund to grow by 13% in the last three years.
