Augsburg Corporation annual meeting

The Governing Board includes representatives from the congregations in these synods, and Augsburg's Board of Regents, faculty, college administrators, and students. An important responsibility of the Governing Board at their annual meeting is to elect new members to Augsburg's Board of Regents.

The Governing Board will join us for chapel on Friday, as Marty Stortz, the new Bernhard Christensen Professor of Religion and Vocation, presents the homily. I hope you'll have an opportunity to join us in chapel and greet the Governing Board.

The first Vocatio Chapel will be on Wednesday, 10:20–10:40 a.m., with Augsburg StepUP alum Melissa Toavs, career probation officer for Hennepin County.
