**Good morning.** On Friday, we welcomed the Augsburg Corporation Governing Board, comprised of representatives from ELCA congregations in the corporation's four synods. This annual meeting is a time when we can share conversations about Augsburg's vocation and about how we as a college can serve the needs of our congregational partners. This year, especially, we were pleased to share with the board the vision and programs of our Center for Faith and Learning as well as to introduce Marty Stortz, the new Bernhard Christensen Professor of Religion and Vocation.

One of the important annual duties of the Governing Board is to elect members of Augsburg's Board of Regents. This year the board elected four new members and reelected three members to second terms.
