MBA faculty and students travel to Russia

MBA professor Magda Paleczny-Zapp and MBA director Steve Zitnick recently completed the second MBA faculty-led study abroad trip, this time to Russia, with 14 students. This highly- intensive program took the group to Moscow and St. Petersburg, focusing on Strategic Management in a Global Environment and Doing Business in Russia. Highlights included visits to well-known multinational companies, such as Medtronic, Lukoil, and WTB Bank. Augsburg MBA students also attended lectures given by professors from Plekhanov University of Economics, and professors Paleczny-Zapp and Zitnick gave lectures to both Russian and Augsburg students. Cultural highlights included the Kremlin, Red Square, Peterhoff Palace, and the Hermitage.

Top producer of Fulbright students once again

The Chronicle of Higher Education has published its annual list of schools, by type of institution, that produce the most number of U.S. Fulbright students. Once again, Augsburg was included, among master's institutions across the country, with four awards from seven applications: Jens Olsen and Heidi Le to teach English in Vietnam, Bethany Hellerich to teach English in Indonesia, and Nou Chang to teach English in Malaysia. Congratulations to Dixie Shafer, URGO director and Fulbright adviser, as well as the faculty and staff who provided essay writing assistance, interviewed students, and helped with Augsburg's institutional evaluations.

In addition to the four Fulbright students, English professor Colin Irvine was selected for Norway as a Fulbright Roving Scholar in American Studies, and the Center for Global Education received a Fulbright-Hays Group Award to provide an educational seminar in Namibia for teachers last summer.
