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Good morning. This week we celebrate activities highlighting the work of two of our centers of commitment, which were established to lift up Augsburg's core values and live out our institutional vocation—the Center for Meaningful Work and the Center for Global Education.

The **Strommen Center's Meaningful Work Week**, "Exploring Meaningful Work—explore, engage, experience," provides students with perspectives on various career areas and helps them prepare to enter professional work. See details about the week's activities below.

A year ago, I announced the creation of this newest of the four centers. Funding was provided by the Strommen family to recognize Clair and Gladys Strommen's personal commitment to creating meaning and purpose in work and life.

Also, this is **International Education Week**, a joint initiative of the U.S. Department of State and the Department of Education to celebrate the benefits of international education and exchange worldwide. The Office of International Programs (OIP) and the International Student Organization (ISO), in collaboration with several other departments, have a week of activities planned—see below.

I am pleased to announce that **Augsburg College will soon be the test site of a new bike shelter**, to be located along 22nd Avenue, near lot B, designed and built by Dero Bike Rack Company, a locally-owned business in the Seward neighborhood. This covered shelter, the Kolo 2 Shelter, will house a Dero Decker bike rack that can hold up to 24 bikes on its two-level articulating racks. Dero donated these items to Augsburg for a year to test their suitability in colder climates. The cement pad was poured and the shelter (painted Auggie maroon) is scheduled for installation this week. Bike riders are welcome to begin using the racks on a first-come, first-served basis. This partnership between Augsburg and Dero is a wonderful example of how we can bring new resources to our college community through exploring mutual interests with neighborhood businesses.

Again, my congratulations to the men's soccer team and Coach Greg Holker for an outstanding season. While the playoffs came to an end for them yesterday with a loss in the second round of the NCAA Division III national tournament to University of Wisconsin-Whitewater, 3–0, it was a record-breaking season that brought Augsburg a trophy for the first time since 1980. Earlier, on Saturday, the Auggies won the first round, by defeating College of St. Scholastica, 1–0, in two overtimes.

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This has been the best season for men's soccer since 1980, with a record 16 victories, the first MIAC postseason playoff championship, and the second NCAA tournament berth in the last three years. In addition, Augsburg swept the MIAC top awards in men's soccer, with Coach Greg Holker named as Coach of the Year and sophomore Chad Gilmer named MIAC Player of the Year. Six other players also earned conference honors. We're proud of the team!

KUDOS

Kudos to Michael Grewe, students Fia Goldfine, Adam Gardner, Dan Meyer, and Kacie Lucchini, and 30 other volunteers as Queer and Straight in Unity and LGBTQIA Services hosted the Fifth Annual Minnesota OUT! conference last weekend. More than 450 people (which surpassed all previous conferences threefold) from 40+ colleges attended, despite the snow, for programming that included more than 70 workshops on a variety topics affecting LGBTQIA and allied communities.

Kudos to **Amanda Erdman**, Residence Life director, and **Tanya Hartwig**, Urness Hall director, who made presentations at the Minnesota College Personnel Association (MCPA) conference on Careers in Student Affairs for undergraduate students, hosted by Augsburg on Saturday, Nov. 6.

Kudos to two Physics Department researchers, Laura Simms and Jennifer Posch, who recently published papers in the *Journal of Geophysical Research*. Laura Simms' paper, "Determining the Key Drivers of Magnetospheric Pc5 Wave Power," was co-authored by Slava Pilipenko of the Russian Academy of Sciences (a frequent visiting scientist at Augsburg) and Mark Engebretson. Jennifer Posch's paper, "Probing the Relationship between EMIC Waves and Plasmaspheric Plumes near Geosynchronous Orbit," was co-authored by 2008 Augsburg graduate Michael Murphy, Michael Denton of Lancaster University (Great Britain), Richard Horne of the British Antarctic Survey, Marc Lessard of the University of New Hampshire, and Mark Engebretson.

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Kudos to Professor **Tim Jones**, English Department and i-Term, who recently published a book, *Outlawry in Medieval Literature* (Palgrave/Macmillan). The book "theorizes the figure of the outlaw in medieval England and uncovers the legal, ethical, and social assumptions that underlie the practice of outlawry."

Kudos to **Jessica Nathanson**, Women's Resource Center, who gave a paper, "Feminist Blogging and the Co-Option of Feminist Theory," on a panel she organized, "Feminist Revolution at the Interface of the Digital Revolution" at the National Women's Studies Association conference in Denver. She also presented on "Online Paper Submission and Digital Grading" at the NWSA Program Administration and Development Pre-Conference roundtable, "The Role of Technology in Women's Studies Program Administration and Teaching: (How) Does It Work?"

Seven students also attended—Gina Brama, Lucreshia Grant, Murriel Kroll, Lily Morris, Annika Gunderson, Christine Salls, and graduate student, Erin Parrish. Lucreshia moderated a panel "Latin American Feminist and Queer Liberation Theologies in Translation: New Perspectives for Queer Studies in the United States" at which three students who studied in Cuernavaca presented, along with Ann Lutterman-Aguilar, CGE Mexico site director and Antonio Ortega, CGE Mexico program coordinator. Ann's paper was "Combating U.S. Centrism in Gender Studies and Queer Studies: Using Feminist Pedagogies and International Education to 'Complicate the Queer'" and Antonio's paper was "The First Visibilities of Homosexuales in Mexico: A Challenge to Conservative Catholic Culture."

Congratulations to **Alex Buffalohead** and **Eric Buffalohead**, Sociology and American Indian Studies, members of the blues band Bluedog, which received the Native American Music Award last Friday for Best Group, for their album *Get Up & Get Out*. The NAMMYs are "the world's first official and largest awards show for Native American music initiatives."
