Good morning. I attended the first-year Honors students' production of "War and Peace and Evolution" on Saturday night (thanks to the students for inviting me!), the culmination of a Theatre Lab that first-year Honors students have participated in for seven years. It was a fine production featuring four vignettes all focused on the theme of how religion and evolution are related (or not!), a topic they are studying in Professor Larry Crockett's Honors 120 course. All of the writing, acting, stage and costume design, and production are done by Honors students under the guidance of Augsburg (and Honors program) alumna Erica Huls.

There is much to remember from the fun and insightful production, but perhaps above all I pause to give thanks for Augsburg students like those in the production who clearly care about ideas and the world and each other. Students are at the center of our lives—they make coming to work each day worth it. And as we all take time to give thanks in our own way later this week, I know I will remember "War and Peace and Evolution" for reminding me how fortunate I am to be part of this remarkable teaching and learning community.

I am delighted to tell you about two new and creative initiatives from last week, directed toward student recruiting and philanthropy, areas of critical importance to us. Last Tuesday night, the Graduate Admissions Office hosted the second of its "In the City" information sessions, this one at the Guthrie Theater. The concept is directly in keeping with our brand—an opportunity to learn about Augsburg's graduate studies while engaging in the city. Attendees toured the Guthrie Theater behind the scenes and were greeted by Augsburg alumna Katie Koch, assistant to director Joe Dowling. Both the first "In the City" session, held at Target Field last summer, and this second event attracted very qualified prospective students who are earnest about their interest in Augsburg and were engaged in and grateful for the added experience. Several have already enrolled in MBA for winter trimester.

The second new project involves student philanthropy, specifically students supporting students. The Augsburg Stewards, together with the Alumni and Constituent Relations Office, sponsored the first "Feed the Pig" student class competition. More than 200 students picked up small, colorful piggy banks into which they'll drop their loose change to cash in later. All the money is tallied by class and will go to current students as a scholarship. The first-year class currently has the lead in number of piggy banks picked up, and the first tally will be on Piggy Round-up Day, December 3. Energy Management System [EMS] Project Update

Since the start of the school year the Facilities Department has undertaken a project to fully upgrade the College's energy management capabilities and

to correct mechanical issues identified through an independent campus commissioning study completed in 2008. The total project cost is \$500,000, funded through a low-cost interest loan arranged through the St. Paul Port Authority. This project has a conservative payback of three years or less and will be paid for through utility cost savings. The anticipated completion date is June 1, 2011.

The current status of this project is:

- The system software has been purchased and installed on the College's network.
- Low voltage connection drops are currently being installed to connect the controller devices to the central system.
- All system controller hardware has been ordered, received, and associated programming of these devises has been completed.

Beginning this week, we will start to bring online all 17 campus facilities, beginning with Christensen Center. This was selected first because of the high use of the facility, and the opportunity to correct ongoing issues with the building systems. Each facility will take approximately one week to bring online, test, and make any necessary operational adjustments to the system.

The completed system product will give the College complete web EMS access, more reliable temperature controls, an opportunity to correct many mechanical operational issues, and unprecedented energy cost savings going forward.

One more opportunity to "Feed the Pig"

Students have another opportunity—today and tomorrow, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., in Christensen Center—to pick up a piggy bank to fill and cash in as a way to support a scholarship for current students. The banks can also be picked up in the Alumni Office, Oren Gateway Center 300, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m., Monday through Friday.
