Hip-hop artist Dessa to present at Nobel Peace Prize Forum: Minneapolis hip-hop artist Dessa will present on ethics and hip hop on March 2 at the Nobel Peace Prize Forum. "Mic Lines: Art, Ethics, and Their Contested Connections," will explore critical questions facing hip-hop today, including whether artists have moral responsibilities, and whether it is possible to write conscientious or peace-oriented lyrics without sounding trite. That's just the tip of the Dessa iceberg. In addition to her multi-faceted, interactive presentation, Dessa will deliver a welcome message earlier in the day to attendees of the NPPF Education Day with Nobel Laureate F.W. de Klerk.

The NPPF offers students, staff, and faculty many opportunities to hear from international, national, and state leaders on topics related to peace and peacemaking from March 1 to 3. This is the first year the 23-year-old Forum will be held in its new Twin Cities-based format. Augsburg is hosting the Forum in conjunction with the Humphrey School of Public Affairs, and the support of our sister Norwegian Lutheran colleges, and our community partners.

Faculty and staff are asked to encourage students to participate in the NPPF. The Augsburg Community – students, faculty, and staff – can attend for half price (\$10 for students, \$20 for faculty and staff) simply by registering using their official Augsburg e-mail address. Members of the Augsburg community who do no use their official Augsburg e-mail address will be charged the full rate of \$20 for students, and \$40 for faculty and staff.
