PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE

Later this week, I will leave for a 10- day trip to China, where I will participate in the annual Minnesota Private College Presidential Lecture Series at United International College (UIC), our sister school in Zhuhai, China. I will be joined by colleagues from several Minnesota private colleges, along with Augsburg representatives Professor Garry Hesser, Professor Bruce Reichenbach, Professor Peter Stark and Assistant Vice President Orv Gingerich. While at UIC, we will spend time with Professor Mark Tranvik and his wife Ann, who are on leave in Zhuhai this semester. I will deliver one of the presidential lectures this year, the topic of which is "A Liberal Arts Life."

In addition, I will spend time with Professor Edmund Kwok, founder of UIC and 2011 Augsburg honorary degree recipient, who will guide me to Chengdu, China, where he is involved in several new educational initiatives. I also will visit Hong Kong Baptist University, where we have a developing relationship for student and faculty exchanges, and the Lutheran Theological Seminary in Hong Kong, which prepares pastors and theologians for all of Asia.

Our important work in China, grounded in our strong relationship with UIC (where many faculty, students and alumni have visited), is one of the central themes of Augsburg 2019, the strategic map that is guiding our planning for the future. We continue to look for ways to strengthen the mutually beneficial ties between China and Augsburg as an extension of our remarkable legacy of international programming through the Center for Global Education.
