Graduation skills, including the Quantitative Reasoning requirements, are completed as follows. Graduation skills in Critical Thinking, Writing, Speaking, and Quantitative Reasoning are required for graduation. Critical Thinking is embedded in all majors. Plans for completion of other graduation skills are determined by the major department. Consult your department chair or faculty advisor to select appropriate courses to meet the Quantitative Reasoning (QR) graduation skill. QR is satisfied by completing one (1) Quantitative Foundational course (QF) and one (1) Quantitative Application course (QA), or one (1) combined QFA course. - The major requires a 300-level literature course, which requires ENL 220 or ENL 221 or a 200-level literature courses as a pre-requisites. A 200-level literature course will also complete a Humanities LAF requirement.
- Students are encouraged to participate in a related short-term study abroad experience. Short-term trips are offered during the summer, to France or Turkey/Greece in alternating years. Talk to Professor Phil Adamo for more information.
- Latin must be taken through the ACTC program, or another approved institution. It will complete the Modern Language requirement, but students are encouraged to take another language such as German, French or Spanish.
