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Planning Sheet: SOCIOLOGY

Students selecting a major in Sociology complete 5 required courses, 3 upper division electives and 2 upper- or lower-division electives. SOC 121: Introduction to Human Society (or equivalent course in transfer) is the starting point for this major. The 200-level electives generally follow SOC 121 during the first and second years, and 300- and 400-level courses are generally taken in the junior and senior year and address specific goals within the major.
