The MSW Program receives a \$75,000 Grant from Hartford Foundation as Part of Nationwide Initiative to Grow the Social Work Workforce Needed for Aging Boom

The MSW program has been awarded a \$75,000 grant over three years to develop an innovative program that prepares social workers to specialize in older adult care. Augsburg will adopt a model developed by the New York Academy of Medicine's Social Work Leadership Institute, with support from the John A. Hartford Foundation. Called the **Hartford Partnership Program for Aging Education**, the program addresses the growing demand for social workers as the nation's aging population is expected to more than triple by 2050.

The grant will support, through a scholarship and additional learning opportunities, the advanced field placement work of 2nd year Master's of Social Work students specializing in serving older adults. Augsburg's unique contribution will be to focus on older adults of color. Augsburg was selected, in consortium with the University of Minnesota, in a competitive national peerreview process. Many thanks to Christina Erickson, Lois Bosch, Laura Boisen, Tony Bibus, Nancy Rodenborg, and Carol Forbes for their work on this.

The Department of Public Safety (DPS) provides first response until emergency assistance is available from Minneapolis police, fire, or medical agencies. Some additional support services provided to the campus community by the Public Safety Department are:

- Maintain a 24-hour Public Safety Service Desk
- Provide routine public safety surveillance
- Provide 24-hour walking escort service (Vehicle escort services are also available and officers will drive someone to the light-rail station and other surrounding areas a short distance from campus).
- Maintain proper documentation of services
- Process reports to appropriate offices
- Monitor public safety, fire, and maintenance alarm systems
- Activate assistance as necessary from the Minneapolis police, fire, or medical agencies
- Monitor campus building access and campus areas by CCTV
- Enforce campus parking regulations
- Work with law enforcement agencies to enforce local, state, and federal laws
- Assist motorists with jump starts and lockouts

DPS also sponsors a Rape Aggression Defense System (R. A. D. Program) aimed at teaching women realistic selfdefense tactics and techniques. The course is free to Augsburg students.
