Social Work Reinvestment Victory: Congress Passes the Higher Education Reauthorization and Opportunity Act!

On July 31, Congress passed the Higher Education Reauthorization and Opportunity Act, (HEA) which will significantly expand student aid for thousands of students pursuing higher education. The President signed H. R. 4137 it into law on August 14, which includes loan forgiveness for social workers, mental health professionals, and school counselors, among other professions.

To find out if you qualify for the loan forgiveness provisions, go to <http://www.federalstudentaid.ed.gov/>. You will need to have federal student loans as private loans are not eligible for loan forgiveness. The Secretary of Education will have to work out many of the implementation details such as the definition of "national need" and whether or not previous years work will count toward the loan forgiveness.

NASW has been working to secure student loan forgiveness legislation for social workers for many years. Last year, we were able to secure loan forgiveness for social workers in the College Cost Reduction Act of 2007
<http://www.socialworkers.org/advocacy/updates/2007/092107.asp>, an important victory for our Social Work Reinvestment Initiative.
